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

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Diana Taurasi owns golden six-pack

PARIS - When Diana Taurasi was announced as a member of the U.S. women's basketball team for the 2024 Paris Olympics, her intentions were clear: She wanted to win one more gold medal than her basketball bestie, Sue Bird, Team USA's longtime point guard.

Sunday evening in Bercy Arena, in the final event of the 2024 Summer Games, Taurasi accomplished that feat when the Americans hung on for a 67-66 win over France to earn an unprecedented eighth consecutive Olympic gold

So, how is it to be able to brag about that to Bird, who was sitting courtside watching the game?

"Yeah, it's the only reason I came. It's funny because we scored the same amount of points today," Taurasi deadpanned after the win, a game in which she did not leave the bench.

In Tokyo three years ago, after Bird and Taurasi had led Team USA to its seventh consecutive gold, Taurasi caused a stir when she ended her TV interview by quipping, "See you in Paris."

She wasn't possibly serious, was she? It turns out she was.

The 42-year-old Taurasi became the oldest U.S. basketball player to compete in the Olympics when she started the first pool play game on July 29 against Japan.

She wasn't the only seasoned veteran playing hoops for the U.S. this summer, as 39-year-old LeBron James led the men to gold over France on Saturday night. But neither of them took the title of oldest hooper at these, or any, Games. That distinction went to 43-year-old Lauren Jackson, who returned to the Australian Opals after a 12-year absence. Australia beat Belgium on Sunday for bronze.

Though coach Cheryl Reeve didn't put Taurasi in the gold medal game, she was effusive in her praise of the woman widely considered to be the GOAT of the WNBA.

defined USA basketball," Reeve said. "And in her final Olympics, the mark that she's making in terms of

leadership, just sharing the knowledge that she has. She's a six-time Olympian who's left her mark every time she's around the team. I don't know that there's a greater competitor in USA basketball (history). Dee is sorta on Mount Rushmore in that way."

Taurasi had an up-and-down Olympics. Though she wasn't scoring much, if at all, she started in all three pool play games that the U.S. played in Lille, a town on the northern border of France. When the team moved to Paris for the knockout round, she was benched in favor of Jackie Young. Taurasi came off the bench to play 14 minutes in the quarterfinals and just six minutes in the

"I think I'll look back on 20 years of being able to wear the jersey, it's truly an honor," Taurasi said of her USAB career. "I've been lucky to be around some of the best players to ever play - when I was younger, some of my idols; in the middle, with my counterparts; and now to see these young guys go out there and get this gold medal, it's a lot of luck, lot of hard work and here I am."

Asked how this medal compares to her other five, Taurai joked, "I like the other ones better."

"It always feels good when you beat the home team at home," she said. "There's a little bit of satisfaction there."

So, what does this mean for the 2028 Olympics, which will be held in Taurasi's hometown of Los Angeles?

"I'll be there," she said, "with a beer, on the beach, sitting next to Sue."

Griner cherishes 'special' 2024 gold medal

PARIS - Brittney Griner's eyes began to fill as she heard the first notes of "The Star-Spangled Banner." As she watched the U.S. flag rise, she cried unabashedly.

It wasn't long ago she was in a Russian prison, uncertain of when - or if she'd get back home. Now, as she stood on the top step of the medals podium, the gold medal she helped win for her country heavy around her neck, Griner was overcome with emotion.

By the time the anthem finished, her face was wet with tears. While her teammates huddled together and began cheesing for photos, Griner took a second to compose herself, swiping at her face with her hand before she joined them.

"It means so much to me," Griner said, her voice growing thick once again. "I didn't think I'd be here, like I've said before. And then to be here winning gold for my country, representing, when my country fought so hard for me to even be standing here - yeah, this gold is going to hold a special place."

Griner's story is known to most everyone by now. Arrested in February 2022 after two nearly-spent vape cartridges with hash oil were found in her bag, she spent almost 10 months in a Russian prison. Though marijuana in any form is illegal in Russia, Griner was a political pawn.

unprovoked invasion of Ukraine, she was a propaganda gold mine for Vladimir Putin in his cold war with the United States. A valuable bargaining chip, too.

In her book, Griner details how dehumanizing and demoralizing her imprisonment was. What kept her going was the love of her family, her basketball family included.

Though Griner said when she returned that she planned to play again, re-entry was not easy. Physically or psychologically. Even here in France, her first trip overseas since her December 2022 release, there were flashbacks.

The first train ride to Lille, where the Arrested just days before Russia's games, was hard. The last time she'd of the national team, having already

been on a train it was to travel between prisons in Russia.

"BG's gone through a lot the last few years," said Diana Taurasi, who is Griner's teammate with the Phoenix Mercury in the WNBA and one of her closest friends. "When you talk about literally where she was (almost) three years ago, it's almost mind boggling that she's been able to get back to this point. It shows a lot of character."

There is something healing for Griner in basketball, though. The affection from her teammates and players from other countries is genuine. After the U.S. women beat Australia in group play, Aussie legend Lauren Jackson sought Griner out in the mixed zone and they exchanged a long hug.

It was the first time the three-time WNBA MVP had seen Griner since her

"We did follow it. It was on the news every day; it was horrible," Jackson said. "I feel really honored that I got the opportunity to match up with her again, even for a couple minutes. She's a beautiful human."

There are those who've tried to paint Griner as anything but, suggesting she somehow deserved the fate she got. Or, worse, was ungrateful to her country. Nothing could be further from the truth, as those who actually know her know.

Griner let it be known soon after she returned that she wanted to play for U.S. women played their group stage USA Basketball again. She is a mainstay

won gold medals in Rio de Janeiro and Tokyo, and putting on the uniform again was the best way she knew to express the gratitude she feels for the United States.

She delighted being around her teammates, who relished the joy she had at these Olympics. She's a friendly and fun presence in any locker room, a quality desperately needed on a stage like this and with massive expectations for the U.S. women.

But there is a burden she carries that no one else can understand. After the final whistle, Griner found wife Cherelle. Then, while her teammates were still celebrating, Griner went backstage and found a bathroom, where she let all of the emotions wash over her.

When you see BG around the team, outward, she's OK. But you know inside, there's a lot going on there," U.S. coach Cheryl Reeve said. "But she always presents her very best version of herself. despite all that she went through.

"And she is thankful to be here. She was so thankful to be here."

U.S. Olympians always talk about the pride they have of representing their country, the privilege of wearing the red, white and blue.

For Griner, though, there is gratitude

USA's Kennedy Blades wins silver in first Olympics

PARIS - Kennedy Blades felt the initially undesired Olympic medal in her hands, looked at it, tossed it slowly to gauge the weight. Then she looked at it some more.

Silver was growing on her quickly. "It's still a cool medal," she said.

Blades' surprising Olympic wrestling run ended Sunday with a 3-1 defeat to Japan's Yuka Kagami, last year's world champion, in the gold medal match of the women's 76-kilogram freestyle competition at Champ de Mars Arena near the Eiffel Tower.

The unseeded Blades, a 20-year-old from Chicago in her first Olympics, had won consecutive matches against the tournament's No. 4, No. 5 and No. 1



Paris Olympics. Only Kagami, the No. 2 seed, proved too difficult for Blades in what was a close, low-scoring six

seeds to reach the final

wrestling match of the

minutes. With 1:22 remaining, Kagami was awarded two points for a takedown and then held on

in the final moments. "I already knew that I was at this level," Blades said, "but I just showed the world. Obviously, I did want gold, of course. But second-best thing.'

After waiting through the Paris Games to compete, Blades emerged in the Olympics' final days as a breakout American star to watch for at the 2028 Games in Los Angeles. A clip spread on social media of her picking up Romania's Catalina Axente and throwing her during an 11-0 victory in Blades' opening match.

And a wider sporting public has started to learn her story: Blades began wrestling at age 7 and reportedly made history by winning a youth title in Illinois competing against boys. She beat the USA's Adeline Gray, silver medalist in Tokyo, in the Olympic trials to make it to Paris.

After Axente, Blades went on to defeat Milaimy Marin Potrille of Cuba (4-3) and top-seeded Aiperi Medet Kvzv of Kyrgyzstan (8-6).

The Cuban wrestler ended up winning bronze with Colombia's Tatiana Renteria Renteria.

"It was really cool that the two bronze medals were also Latina," Blades said. "So it was three of us on that podium,

and I don't know if that's ever really happened. It was really cool that we were able to represent our heritage."

Blades said she hopes that will help inspire younger Latina athletes and wrestlers.

"Growing up (in sports)," she said, "I didn't really have a role model."

After attending Arizona State University, Blades is set to transfer to the University of Iowa and start fall classes later this month, though she said, "I haven't even seen campus or anything."

As for her new silver medal? It's going to her parents.

"Just because I don't trust myself," she said with a laugh, noting that a couple of previous medals she'd won were somewhere in a bag that she hasn't been

"We're going to keep this one safe."

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Matsuyama wins after lead erased

Hideki Matsuyama blew a big lead but he recovered to birdie the final two holes and edge Viktor Hovland and Xander Schauffele by two strokes to win the 2024 FedEx St. Jude Championship.

'No lead is safe and I knew someone was going to make a run," Matsuyama

said Sunday of falling a stroke back. "I felt today's victory slipping away. ... I knew I had to birdie and somehow I was able to get it on the green and (make the putt). It made 18 a lot easier to play."

The 32-year-old Japanese star had his wallet stolen last week and didn't have his coach or caddie, who had their passports lifted in the theft, at his disposal but it didn't bother his game. "Maybe because of that, I won this week," Matsuyama mused.

Or it may have been because he changed putters and had his best putting week of the season, closing in evenpar 70 at TPC Southwind in Memphis, Tennessee, on Sunday and a 72-hole total of 17-under 263. Matsuyama typically travels with as many as six different putters and before the tournament began he tinkered with them on the practice green. "I felt like I needed a change of pace, kind of a refresh with my putter," he explained.

Matsuyama, who won the bronze medal two weeks ago at the Paris Olympics, built a five-stroke lead, the largest 54-hole lead on the PGA Tour this season. But he still took three putters to the practice green on Sunday morning. He elected to stick with the Scotty Cameron putter that had treated him so well since he stuck it in the bag on Thursday.

"I've had the putter for a while, and I thought, well, it might be a good week to debut that putter," said Matsuyama, who gained 8.2 strokes on the greens against the field.

Wearing a splash of his Sunday yellow and white, he opened with seven consecutive pars before he buried a 39foot birdie putt at No. 8 and a 19-foot birdie putt at No. 11. On another typically hot and humid day, it looked as if Matsuyama wouldn't need to break a sweat walking the difficult closing stretch in Memphis at a course where he lost in a playoff three years ago. Matsuyama played his first 65 holes in 19 under and then the next five in 4 over, finding the water off the tee at the par-3 14th for a bogey and a double bogey at the 15th that cost him the lead to Hovland.

"I knew I still had two holes left, and that was just what I was thinking: Two more holes. I've got to make one birdie," Matsuyama said.

Matsuyama then sank a 26-foot uphill birdie putt at 17 to regain the lead and hit a beauty at 18 to 6 feet to seal his second win of the season, 10th career tour title and improve to third in the FedExCup standings.

Schauffele trailed Matsuyama by nine strokes to start the day but birdied four of the first six holes and shot a bogey-free 7-under 63.

"It was a head-down day," said Schauffele, who lipped out a birdie chip at 18. "You're so far back."

It's been a disappointing year for Hovland, who had recorded one top-10 finish this season. He needed to jump into the top 50 this weekend to advance to the BMW Championship, otherwise he would've been the first player not to defend his title at the BMW. He made a bogey at 17 and missed a 9foot birdie putt in his bid to win his third consecutive FedExCup Playoffs event dating to last year.

Still, he vaulted to No. 16 in the season-long standings and will have a chance to defend his title at the Tour Championship.

World No. 1 Scottie Scheffler, who remains in the lead in the FedExCup standings, drained a 41-foot birdie putt at 18 to shoot 66 and finish fourth.

"I put up a good fight this week," Scheffler said. "I tried to make my way up the leaderboard, but I just wasn't able to do it."

After the Olympics, Matsuyama stopped in London for one day and enjoyed a celebratory meal with his caddie, Shota Hayato, and coach, Mikihito

Matsuyama had already paid the bill when a robber swiped his wallet and also nabbed the passports and visas of his caddie. The members of Matsuyama's team had no choice but to return to Japan and request expedited travel documents instead of going to Memphis for the first leg of the Play-

"Luckily I only lost my wallet," said Matsuyama, who talked to his coach every day and used the regular caddie of fellow Japanese tour pro Ryo Hisatsune. "I've forgotten it completely. It's not even an issue now."

Nothing would stop Matsuyama from finally winning a FedExCup Play-

"I've tried hard for 10 years, and it's a great feeling of satisfaction to finally be able to have done it," he said.

PGA Tour referee: No rules violation

Did Hideki Matsuyama violate Rule 8-1 during the final round of the FedEx St. Jude Championship on Sunday? The PGA Tour determined that a violation wasn't committed by the eventual champion, but the moment is worth closer investigation.

On the 12th hole, PGA Tour chief rules referee Gary Young spoke to Matsuyama.

Rule 8-1 from the Rules of Golf addresses "Players Actions That Improve Conditions Affecting the Stroke," and in this particular circumstance there was some concern whether Matsuyama had improved his line by tapping down his pitch mark after his second shot at the seventh hole at TPC Southwind had rolled back into a collection area. Matsuyama clearly walked up to the green and tapped down his pitch mark before playing his third shot on

"Rule 8-1 is very specific about what a player can do as it pertains to the line of play," Young explained in a postround interview with Golf Channel's Todd Lewis. "It came to our attention that Hideki may have done something on his line of play."

Young approached the Japanese star and addressed the situation with Matsuyama and his interpreter, Robert Turner. Matsuyama had just made a birdie to reach 19 under and owned a seemingly commanding five-stroke lead.

"The video showed that Hideki walked forward and stepped down with irregularity at a what turned out to be a pitch mark. At that point, it was a question of whether it was on his line of play. A couple of video angles showed that it was close, close enough to have to have that conversation with him, and unfortunately we had to have that conversation mid-round with him, which is never comforting when you have to go out and talk with that player," Young said. "But it could affect his strategy playing for the rest of the round if he is going to get a two-stroke penalty. So, I simply had to ask him the question, Hideki, on that hole, and he did recall the situation that he had walked forward. I asked him what exactly did he do and why did he do it, he just said it was something that he normally does when he has a pitch mark and he felt it was nowhere near his line of play and that was why he stepped it

"Following the conversation with him, I felt very comfortable that he felt it was well off his line of play and then

we did get supporting video evidence from a different camera angle which clearly showed where he plays his shot and where the pitch mark was. It was a good 3 feet away. Now, some people may say, well, that's pretty close. For that short of a shot and one of the best players in the world that is a pretty tight area you're talking about, so, the committee felt very, very comfortable with the de-

Lewis pressed Young if there was any additional discussion thereafter whether a rules violation had occurred and Young answered, "In my mind, when we had that conversation, I felt a comfort level that he was well off his line of play."

Lewis also asked why it took several holes for Matsuyama to be informed of the potential rules violation.

"It took some time for the message to come to me that this potential violation had occurred. Then it took time to look for any video evidence. Next it was circulated to all of the members of the rules committee and Young also consulted with the USGA to make sure they had their support," he said. "It felt really bad to possibly have affected him, but that's the rough part of our job."

Matsuyama's round went off the rails as he played holes 12 to 16 in 4 over and lost the lead temporarily to Viktor Hovland before righting the ship and making birdies on the final two holes to win by two strokes over Hovland and Xander Schauffele.

"It was really a non-issue," Matsuyama said after the round. "They just wanted to check and make sure that the rules were kept, which they were. And it really did not affect me the rest of the

Brooks Koepka first to five career wins in LIV Golf

Brooks Koepka shot a final-round 7-under-par 63 to leapfrog the field at the LIV Golf Greenbrier event Sunday to become the first five-time winner on the three-year-old circuit.

It's Koepka second win this season following the LIV Golf event in Singapore in May.

He got back in the winner's circle Sunday at The Old White Course at The Greenbrier in White Sulphur Springs, West Virginia, after outlasting Richard Bland, Jason Kokrak and Jon Rahm down the stretch. Rahm was the 36-hole leader after his second-round 8-under 62 but shot a final-round 5-under 65, matching Koepka after 54 holes.

The duo went to a playoff, where Koepka won with a par. Rahm won the last LIV event in the UK.

Last week, Koepka's Smash GC

teammate Graeme McDowell was suspended for one event for violating LIV Golf's anti-doping policy.

Koepka banked \$4 million for the win. He will also share the \$3 million team prize with his Smash GC teammates Kokrak, Talor Gooch and fill-in John Catlin, who subbed in during Mc-Dowell's suspension.

First albatross on tour

On Saturday, LIV Golf had its first albatross when Brendan Steele holed his second shot from 285 yards at the par-5 17th with a 4-wood. It's also the longest holed shot in LIV Golf history.

Steele said he didn't see it go in.

"We were trying to be aggressive, get it up there and have a chance for a 3," he said. "It flew like all the way back to the hole and landed really soft and just kind of trickled in, I guess. Really cool.

"Obviously wasn't expecting that."

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
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
