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
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Irish eyes smile down on McIlroy

PONTE VEDRA BEACH, Fla. - As Rory McIlroy warmed up for a three-hole aggregate playoff against J.J. Spaun to decide The Players Championship, a tournament volunteer walked over and said, "Feels like an Irish day, doesn't it?"

With the wind whipping and the temperature in the 50s, McIlroy acknowledged the similarities, smiled and kept loosening up. But it wasn't lost on the 35-year-old son of Holywood, Northern Ireland, that it was St. Patrick's Day. He said he even looked for a green shirt to wear but hadn't packed one for the occasion. It's a day when Irish eyes have smiled on him before and they would again as McIlroy won the three-hole aggregate playoff by three strokes.

As PGA Tour Commissioner Jay Monahan noted, it was the second time McIlroy had won The Players on St. Patrick's Day, having done so in 2019. "I think he had every intention of pushing this thing into Monday so he could do it again," Monahan said.

As McIlroy later pointed out he had also won the Arnold Palmer Invitational on the national holiday, "so it's been a good luck charm for me.'

The three-hole aggregate playoff was over quickly as McIlroy avoided mistakes. He ripped a 336-yard driver at the par-516th, the first playoff hole, planted his second shot to 33 feet and two-putted for birdie to take a one-shot lead heading to the 130-yard island green. During his warm-up session, McIlroy had turned around and hit three-quarter 9 irons to the third green, measuring the distance with his Trackman to simulate the conditions he would face at 17, and it paid off as he stuck his tee shot safely on the green and 30 feet from the

"I have this little three-quarter, three-quarter shot, I call it. It's threequarter backswing with three-quarter speed," he said. "I practiced a ton of those shots on the range all week, just knowing that we were going to play in windy conditions."

With the amphitheater ringed with

fans, many of whom must have called in sick or played hooky - McIlroy joked, "Obviously no one works in Jacksonville" - Spaun, hitting second, had gone to the other side of the range essentially to do the same thing as McIlroy, but his 8-iron came out pure and flew the green into the water.

"I hit a great shot. I did what I needed to do. I couldn't believe it was long," Spaun said. "It just wasn't my luck of the

Spaun made a triple-bogey 6 and McIlroy a bogey to take a three-stroke lead to the final hole and a bogey was enough to secure his 28th PGA Tour title and become the eighth player to win The Players multiple times. He also joined an exclusive group consisting of Jack Nicklaus, Tiger Woods and Scottie Scheffler to win multiple majors and multiple Players titles.

On Sunday, McIlroy roared out of the gate with a birdie-eagle start to make his move. Tee times had been moved up to avoid a forecast of thunderstorms, but Mother Nature wouldn't be denied. After a four-hour suspension of play, McIlroy birdied the 12th hole to take a three-stroke lead with six holes to play. But Spaun, 34, refused to quit, making tap-in birdies at Nos. 14 and 16 and his 30-foot birdie putt at the 72nd hole stopped just short of the hole.

Tied at 12-under 276, McIlroy, who shot 4-under 68, lamented not closing the door. He said he watched some of the movie "The Devil Wears Prada" while eating room service, reset and came back committed to get the job done. But not without his share of nerves. McIlroy said he woke up at 3 a.m. and couldn't get back to sleep.

"I was as nervous as I can remember,"

On paper it was a mismatch between McIlroy, the four-time major champion and world No. 2, and Spaun, who had just one victory in 227 career starts. He still had scar tissue from blowing the 54-hole lead at the 2022 FedEx St. Jude Championship.

"I didn't want to have that feeling of, not defeat, but just like crawl-into-ahole-and-die kind of a feeling because it

was just so embarrassing," Spaun said. "I was just afraid to feel embarrassed again.'

But he leaned into the underdog mentality, that all the pressure was on McIlroy, who was expected to win, and said he believed he could win.

Except during the playoff, he played as if a spell that had turned Spaun into Cinderella at the ball for the past four days at TPC Sawgrass had expired at midnight on Sunday. He missed the fairway and hit his bunker shot heavy at 16, settling for par, made triple bogey at 17 and played 18 like a 10 handicap to giftwrap the victory to a popular champion.

McIlroy said that he could relate to Spaun's fear of failure.

"We've all had periods where we've felt like that. I've had to go through it," he said. "Even walking from the 16th green to the 17th tee today, I could see myself hitting it in the water, right?" he said. "That's something that crosses your mind, and it's like, OK, how do I replace that thought with a better one and visualize and get myself into the moment. I've practiced hard at that, and definitely getting better at it.

'People say pressure is a privilege, and it really is. You want to feel like that on the course. That's why I spend the time that I do practicing and trying to master my craft, that you get yourself in those positions to see what you're made

McIlroy said he's been inspired by Scheffler, the world No. 1 whose seven victories last season included a repeat at The Players.

"I knuckled down," McIlroy said.

NBC's Dan Hicks noted during the trophy ceremony that McIlroy was just the second player to win the tournament despite missing more than half the fairways at TPC Sawgrass.

"Dan, let's focus on the positives," McIlroy cracked.

But it highlighted that McIlroy can putt and chip well enough and is capable of escaping from trouble, such as the pine straw this past week, when his driver misbehaves.

"I feel like I'm a better player now than I ever have been, and it's nice to see the fruits of my labor paying off," he

With a win last month at the AT&T Pebble Beach Pro-Am, McIlroy has won twice on U.S. soil in a calendar year for the first time before the Masters. How does he plan to prepare for his latest pursuit of trying to win the Masters and complete the career Grand Slam in April, the only one of the 12 months on the calendar where he's never tasted

"Double down on what I'm doing," he said. "Continue to do the same thing."

It worked for the Northern Irishman on St. Patrick's Day, a day he said he doesn't traditionally celebrate but he may consider toasting his latest victory with some sort of green concoction.

"It's a pretty big deal in Ireland," he said. "I feel like you guys take it to another level here."

At The Players Championship, McIlroy was the one who showed he can take it to another level without his best stuff.

Cup Series driver Josh Berry loves Las Vegas

From a guy who had won three straight weeks to a guy who had never secured a victory.

Christopher Bell's streak died Sunday at Las Vegas Motor Speedway, and Josh Berry earned his first NASCAR Cup Series win.

Berry took the lead from Daniel Suarez with 13 laps left in the Pennzoil 400. He held off Suarez and third-place driver Ryan Preece to take the checkered flag in the No. 21 Wood Brothers ride.

This is his first season in that seat. "Oh, man," Berry said after his victory lap. "I don't even know what to think.



Just awesome. I love this track. Las Vegas has been so good to me. I've had so many great moments here. ... We just battled and battled and battled. It was our day. I just can't believe it. Such a battle

with Daniel there at the end." Only 53 starts into his Cup Series career, Berry is already a journeyman.

He made his big-league debut in 2021, running two races as a fill-in for Spire Motorsports. In 2023, he returned to the Cup Series as a substitute for Hendrick Motorsports and, later that year, Legacy Motor Club.

Finally, in 2024, he earned a full-time spot at NASCAR's highest level, replacing Kevin Harvick in the No. 4 car for Stewart-Haas Racing. During the season, Stewart-Haas announced plans to close its doors. So Berry signed with the Wood Brothers, who were looking to upgrade from Harrison Burton.

It took the 34-year-old just five races with his new organization to find victory lane. Berry is the 20th driver to win a race in a Wood Brothers car. The team now possesses 101 all-time victories.

Christopher Bell's winning streak stops at three

Bell started his bid for a fourth

straight victory in the back of the field. Despite qualifying 13th, he received a penalty because his Joe Gibbs Racing team made unapproved changes to his No. 20 Toyota. It swapped the throttle body. By the end of Stage 1, Bell had worked his way up to 10th.

In Stage 2, after racing into the top five, he encountered a loose left front tire coming out of his pit box. Before leaving pit road, he stopped in Chase Briscoe's box, and the No. 19 team tightened it for him. That drew a penalty, sending Bell back to the rear. But if the wheel would have fallen off on the track,

he would've suffered a two-lap penalty. He ended Stage 2 in 27th and finished

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NC State's hot shooting ends MSU's run

The Michigan State women's basketball program took a big step Saturday when they earned their first NCAA Tournament victory in six years.

The Spartans' quest to add to that and take another step was thwarted by hot-shooting North Carolina State.

No. 7 seed MSU fell into a large early deficit while having its season come to an end with an 83-49 loss to the host and No. 2 seed Wolfpack in an NCAA Tournament second round contest at Reynolds Arena.

North Carolina State (28-6) never trailed while denying the Spartans in their bid to reach the Sweet 16 for just the fourth time in program history and first since 2009.

The Wolfpack set an NCAA tournament program record with 15 made 3pointers and shot 50% from the field while ending MSU's season.

"A really tough finish for our season," Fralick said. "A lot of credit to N.C. State. I thought they played outstanding. We kind of ran into a buzz saw. They shot the ball really, really well. What I shared with the team after is this game isn't our

season. I think it doesn't feel great to finish with a game like this, but you know there's things that are happening in our program that we're really proud of. We feel like we keep building. We made it a game further this year.

"I think it was the first NCAA Tournament win in the Michigan State program in six years. (I'm) really proud of our collective season, really proud of our girls and seniors that we love so much. It's hard to have a last game with them. (They) meant so much to me personally and to our program. I'm really proud of our team and the work that we've done over the course of a year."

Grace VanSlooten recorded a second straight double-double and had 15 points and 11 rebounds to lead MSU, which closes the season with a 22-10 record. VanSlooten was the only player in double-digit scoring for the Spartans, who were held to a season-low in

North Carolina State used its best 3point shooting performance of the season while knocking off the Spartans and earning a return trip to the Sweet 16. The Wolfpack set a season high for made 3s while shooting 50% from beyond the arc in the game. That included hitting five 3s in each of the first and second guarters while going 10 of 16 from behind the 3-point arc in the opening half while owning a 24-point advantage at the

In addition to their hot shooting, the Wolfpack held the Spartans to a seasonlow 23 points in the opening half.

"There was a little bit of frustration," VanSlooten said. "Obviously, like coach said, it's not the way you want to go out. All credit to N.C. State. They played a great game and were knocking down all their shots. I don't know, (we were) kind of speechless. You don't really know what to do when a team is doing that. I'm really happy being here with this team and happy that we got to a round

Aziaha James had a game-high 26 points and was 10 of 16 from the field and hit 6 of 11 from 3-point range for the Wolfpack, who went 18-0 on their home court this season.

'We've got some veterans that are very talented and step up when the lights are the brightest is when they really step up and play," North Carolina State coach Wes Moore said.

'We shot the heck out of (the ball) going 15 of 30 from 3 and 50% from the field. We did a pretty good job of taking care of (the ball). I know that sounds funny having 11 turnovers, but with their press and their pressure and that was probably the biggest concern coming into the game."

South Carolina's defense refuses to panic

On Sunday afternoon in Columbia, South Carolina, Indiana Hoosiers guard Chloe Moore-McNeil dribbled toward the sideline during the first half of a tight March Madness second-round matchup. South Carolina guard Raven Johnson, engaged on defense, closely tracked her every move. Moore-McNeil eventually trailed off, passing the ball to junior guard Shay Ciezki, who was waiting to set up a score.

Ciezki moved quickly and decisively toward the basket from the elbow, looking to extend No. 9 seed Indiana's sixpoint lead on the No. 1 seed Gamecocks. As she approached the basket, senior guard Te-Hina Paopao was in lockstep until suddenly, she jumped up, still in stride and blocked Ciezki's shot at-

There it is.

South Carolina's typically stellar defense awakened from its unusual slum-

Moments later, forward Sania Feagin added a layup, and Bree Hall quickly followed with a timely 3-point basket. Feagin unleashed another layup, and star freshman Joyce Edwards drained a pair of free throws. The Gamecocks were doing what they do best: using their defense to create offense. Still, they found themselves down 26-25 at halftime, an eerie too-close-for-comfort feeling that reeked of a similar 2024 NCAA Tournament matchup with Indiana during the Sweet 16.

At the start of the third quarter in that game, then star center Kamilla Cardoso and Johnson danced to "Macarena" shortly before Indiana put up 43 points in the second half, including a 23-point third quarter that ate into a massive lead. The Hoosiers closed the gap, making South Carolina sweat until it walked away with a nail-biting 79-74 win to keep its undefeated season alive.

No one was dancing on Sunday.

Instead, head coach Dawn Staley implored her team to dig deeper at halftime. Indiana wouldn't go quietly. "I'm proud of our team the way they gutted up and didn't flinch," Staley said postgame. "It wasn't pretty, but at this time, it doesn't have to be. You just have to score more points."

That's the improbability of March Madness; it doesn't make logical basketball sense. It just has to work. With help from Feagin, who dissected the Hoosiers' defense during the third quarter, and a push from forward Chloe Kitts, South Carolina took over the game and extended its lead, once again reaching the Sweet 16 for the fifth consecutive season after a 64-53 win. The Gamecocks ended their day with 20 fastbreak points and 18 points from 16 Indiana turnovers.

The question remains: How does South Carolina not panic after an ugly game ahead of its Sweet 16 matchup?

"We weren't really panicked because

we know our first half wasn't very good," Kitts explained postgame to 107.5 The Game. "It wasn't very good because we weren't making our shots, our easy layups – everything like that. So, we just know we need to calm down ...'

That's the key: The Gamecocks are calm in adversity.

It's how they've learned what it takes to win a championship. As the competition gets more challenging, South Carolina can't flinch. As teams throw more at them, the Gamecocks can't be too small for the moment. However, the calm isn't just the players from year to year or any speeches that may come when the Gamecocks need them the most. The calm is also Staley. It always has been during her tenure.

Three-time WNBA MVP and fourtime Olympic teammate of Staley's, Lisa Leslie, recently dove deeper into what Staley means to South Carolina's program. "South Carolina has been able to see it was worth it to invest in Dawn Staley - and how she changed this program and the impact she's had on these young women," Leslie explained. Staley's impact on her players ex-

tends beyond the baskets that light up the court or the back-breaking transition steals that deflate opponents. She allows her players to be them in whatever form that may be.

"It's a day care," Staley said Sunday. "Not a board meeting where one person is talking at a time."

If South Carolina hoists another trophy in 2025, her players will likely remember when everything seemingly felt heavy and impossible. But there she was, calm amid unmistakable chaos, helping the day care run without a hitch.

"I think we created a legacy already, whether we win this one or not," Staley recently shared. "What we've done over the past eight years won't be done again. If we win another one, it just adds to our legacy in the game."

NBA champ ranks Lauren Betts among UCLA great centers

LOS ANGELES - Lauren Betts now ranks among the legendary UCLA centers, according to a former Los Angeles Laker and two-time NBA champion.

After Betts had 30 points and 14 rebounds to lead UCLA past Richmond 84-67 in the second round of the Women's NCAA Tournament, Betts had something else: a massive compliment from Mychal Thompson, who won two NBA championship rings with the Lakers in 1987 and 1988.

Thompson wrote on X: "UCLA Center

"That's crazy,"

Like Abdul-Jabbar (Lew Alcindor during his time at UCLA) and Walton before her, the 6-foot-7 Betts was a force for UCLA near the basket Sunday night at Pauley Pavilion. She was 14-for-17 from the floor. In addition to her 14 rebounds, she had four assists and showed why he's a candidate for national Defensive Player of the Year.

And now trying to lead UCLA (32-2) the top overall seed – to the school's first NCAA title in women's basketball.

"She's an absolute generational player," UCLA coach Cori Close said. "She is not ... just a low-post player. I mean, watch her move out there. The way that she guarded and switched, and even when she made some mistakes, the way that she chased people at 6-7. And she's really 6-8, by the way.

"But she's just an elite player. She has basketball IQ. She's incredibly competitive. She affects the game in so many ways on offense and defense. The list goes on and on."

Said Kiki Rice, UCLA's star point guard, was more succinct when asked about playing with Betts: "It makes life easy.'

Now Betts, a junior, is looking for something Abdul-Jabbar and Walton won – an NCAA championship.

For the third year in a row, UCLA has advanced to the Sweet 16, setting up a matchup with No. 5 seed Mississippi on
